

# **Title IX in K-12 and College Campus Environments**

## **Program Description**

Title IX, The US Federal Civil Rights Law passed as part of the Education Amendments of 1972, has been translated many different ways over the past decade alone. While many of the translations have not gotten a lot of attention outside of specialized audiences, a few other translations have received national coverage. The letter and spirit of the law known as Title IX has serious implications for students in our primary and secondary schools. The presenter will provide an overview of Title IX, describe its changes over time, and discuss what the real-world consequences of these changes have been on school climates and on individual students.

## **Program Objectives**

Upon completion of this program, participants will be able to:

- Provide an overview of Title IX and how it plays out in school contexts;
- Discuss the problem of sexual violence on college campuses;
- Describe the use of Title IX to prevent and better respond to sexual violence on college campuses, including a snapshot of where the law stands now and what the future may hold.
