

Understanding Autism: The Impact of Emotional Regulation Issues and Social Cognitive Challenges on Behavior and Academics

Program Description

Social cognitive challenges and emotional regulation issues are cited as core challenges for individuals with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and related disorders. As a result, individuals with ASD are prone to a higher incidence of social and behavioral problems at home or at school. Social cognitive challenges not only impact interpersonal relationships, but also academics. This session will provide an overview of these core challenges and outline selected evidence-based social and emotional intervention strategies, which can be implemented to help improve the lives of children and teens on the autism spectrum. As a parent of a young adult with ASD as well as a clinical social worker working with this population, the presenter will share selected stories and examples from both her clinical work and from her son's life to illustrate not only the core challenges, but the positive impact of these intervention strategies. This workshop is appropriate for parents and caregivers of individuals with ASD.

1. Explain the emotional regulation and social challenges faced by individuals with ASD and related disorders;
2. Describe the origins of social cognitive challenges in individuals with ASD and how these can affect behavior, relationships and academics;
3. Discuss selected evidence-based emotional regulation and social cognitive intervention strategies that can be taught to children and teens with ASD to help improve behavior and flexibility throughout their day.
